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Tonight's guest soloist, Steve Houghton, is one of the busiest musicians in the business. He is a clinician for Yamaha Musical Instruments! He has played for numerous television shows and motion pictures. Steve has performed with over fifty college and university bands. His professional career includes performances with Woody Herman, Perry Como, Doc Severinsin, and on the "Tonite Show". Steve has also performed frequently with the jazz great Freddie Hubbard.

William Bing, tonight's conductor, is Instrumental Music Director at Caltech. In addition to his duties at Caltech, he plays and teaches the trumpet. In the last year, Bill performed and recorded with the Los Angeles Philharmonic. He also performs frequently with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra and with the popular dance band, Art Deco and His Society Orchestra.

James Blinn came to JPL in 1977 and became involved with the Voyager Project by producing computer animations of the planetary encounters to give the public a feel for where the real images came from. He also plays principal trombone in the Caltech Wind Ensemble.

Composers

Manton M. Barnes and Frank H.Wiegand are credited with the composing of six Caltech/Gnome Club songs, in the 1920's. The Throop Institute March, by E. C. Kammermeyer, dates from 1900.

Barnes received a degree in Civil Engineering in 1921. He was a popular student, participated in student activities and received awards. He was Manager of the Big T, Band Leader, member of the Board of Control, Press Cluh, Student Body Publicity Manager, Honor Key recipient. He sang in the Glee Club and "In concerts (they went on tour) the BB twins, Brush and Barnes, on a piang and banjo, had some novelty acts that were in a class by themselves."

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In the '20's Caltech excelled in athletics - football,
basketball and track. Particular culprit was UCSB (University
of California Southern Branch, a teacher training school
on North Vermont Avenue in Los Angeles - now UCLA in
Westwood). In addition, regularly trounced Pomona, Occidental,
Whittier, Redlands and Sherman (Indian) Institute in
Riverside.

Wiegand graduated in 1927 with a major in Electrical Engineering. He was a popular member of the Gnome Club and lived in the fraternity house at 289 South Madison Avenue. He was a gifted pianist, playing entirely by ear. Hearing a tune once, he could play it immediately and apparently never forgot it.

As reported in "The Gnome Club - Throop & Caltech":
"In a Gnome Club business session, the Treasurer reported that the electric bill was getting out of hand and that members should study more by daylight. Frank Wiegand responded 'Keep on studying at night fellows. I'll take care of the light bill.' We didn't realize, and Frank forgot, that he had reversed the wires at the light meter. Within a few weeks a City investigtor discovered the trick after records showed that the City owed the Gnome Club!" All was forgiven and Frank later had an outstanding career with the Southern California Edison Company.

Frank was the Student Body's enthusiastic Yell Leader. A radio buff, he organized the Radio Club. Other activities included Glee Club, Throopers and the Big T staff.

The Gnome Club.

Caltech's oldest social organization, the Gnome Club was founded in 1897 by James C. Creamer, President of Throop Polytechnic Institute. It began as an Honorary Society, then became a living group and in the era when Greek-lettrered secret societies were being formed on college campuses, the Gnomes adopted Greek legends (and learned a lot of history in the process). The Gnome fraternity house provided a marvelous experience for its members. When the on-campus student houses were built in 1931, fraternity houses were phased out. The Gnome Club continued as an alumni organization and now initiates members from the senior class.

Lead Us On Our Fighting Beaver - Wiegand Caltech students adopted the beaver as their mascot,

it being the engineer of the animal kingdom. A stuffed beaver had a pedestal of distinction in Throop Hall. It appeared at football games and other events. Several attempts were made by raiding parties from competing colleges, to kidnap it - probably in retaliation for similar Caltech raids, like stealing the Occidental Tiger.

Lead us on our fighting beaver 'Till the foe shall yield Onward down the field Our courage ever steeled Lead us on amid the clouds of darkness And of doubt and fear Until the world shall recognize The fighting engineers.

<u>Hail C.I.T.</u> Barnes In the $^{1}20^{\circ}$ s this song, published in the 1921 Big T, became the Caltech Anthem. Students stood at attention while singing It has merited special distinction throughout the years.

In Southern California In grace and splendor bound Where the lofty mountain peaks Look out to lands beyond. Proudly stands our Alma Mater Glorious to see. We raise our voices hailing, Hailing, hailing thee. Echoes ringing while we're singing Over land and sea; The halls of fame Resound thy name, Noble C. I.T.

Gnome Sweetheart Song - Barnes This has become the favorite song of the Gnome Club. The words are representative of the romantic era of the 1920's. It is a catching tune and easy to sing and remember.

In the evening by the moonlight, In the merry, merry month of June -With your litle Gnome sweetheart Underneath the Gnome moon, Sit together in a porch swing That's big enough for one, Strong enough for two, That's the way your "KG"

Good Fellows All - Wiegand Good fellows all who gather here; Kappa Gamma are we. Friendships made true by the fireside's glow, Emblem of loyalty. The Owl sits high on the crescent moon; Silent and wise is he.

Hail to the spirit of brotherhood -Gnome fraternity.

Throop Institute March - Kammermeyer. In 1900 members of the Throop Club, Gnome Club and the

Spends his honeymoon.

Mandolin and Guitar Club visited Catalina Island and became acquainted with the Catalina Island Marine Band. Director, E. C. Kammermeyer, must have learned that Throop had no official marching song, so he composed one - the catching Throop Institute March. It was published by the Exton Music Co. of Los Angeles. The cover had pictures of TPI buildings and the 18 members of the Mandolin and Guitar Club, "all using Regal Instruments". Then it became lost. Thanks to a search in 1987, it was found, was orchestrated and recorded. It is now a historic treasure. These are lyrics but they are not extensive. They are: "We yell for Throop! We yell for Throop! We yell for Throop, for Throop, for Throop, for Throop, for Throop! Throop! Throop!" There is no record of who wrote those timeless words.
