' illiam Bing, the director of Caltech's Jazz Bands, has been teaching at Caltech since 1971. In addition to his duties at Caltech. Bill plays and teaches trumpet in the Los Angeles area. Bill has played trumpet with everyone from the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra to Henry Mancini. He has appeared at the Hollywood Bowl, the Los Angeles Music Center, and has performed for movie sound tracks, television, and commercials. Bill and his wife Delores were the recipients of the 16th Annual "Excellence in Teaching Award" from the Associated Students of Caltech.

Mary Davis grew up in New Orleans and picked the flute to play because she wanted to march in the Mardi Gras parades carrying a light instrument. Although she was not a music major, music has always been a strong and ever present force in her life. During her studies toward her B.S. in Chemical Engineering and a MBA in Finance at Virginia Tech, she continued to study privately and to play in all the University groups. During her work at the DuPont Chemical Co. and later at Virginia Tech as Manager for the Civil Engineering Dept. she played in various chamber groups and was first flutist with the New River Valley Symphony in Blacksburg, Virginia. She moved to Pasadena in 1991 with her

husband, who is a Chemical Engineering professor at Caltech. Mary has been a member of the Caltech Band for three years and also enjoys her occasional performances at the First United Methodist Church here in Pasadena. After taking time off from playing for the birth of her three children (including twins), Mary continues to find and use music as a source of relaxation. When she is not running the household or chauffeuring the children around, she works as a financial business manager for several clients. She hopes you enjoy this short, melodic movement from the Claude Bolling Jazz Suite as much as she enjoys playing it.

Dr. Leslie J. Deutsch has a long and broad musical experience. Early on, is father, Ralph, taught him to play trumpet. He began instruction in classical organ and harmony at 11. He taught himself to play several instruments each year so that now he performs on almost all keyboards, brass, and woodwinds. This helps in his work as a composer of classical and jazz music. Les studied Mathematics at Caltech, receiving his Ph.D. in 1980. He combined his two interests while working for his father, the inventor of the first digital musical instruments. Today, Les works at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory where he

manages NASA's research and development program for deep space communications and mission operations. He holds over 25 patents, mostly in electronic music.

Terry Luedders is one of America's leading classical saxophone performers. In 1978 he premiered a concerto by Skrowaczewski in the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. and won a Kennedy Center Friedheim Award. In 1969, Professor Luedders formed the International Saxophone Quartet which toured extensively throughout the United States and Europe. Professor Luedders is a graduate of the University of Michigan and Indiana University. Dr. Luedders has pursued postgraduate studies at the Paris Conservatory and Harvard University. He has twice been listed in the "Outstanding Educators of America" as well as the "World's Who's Who of Musicians." He is currently

Professor and Chair of the Department of Music at California State University, Northridge.

Ashwin Vasavada is a fifthyear graduate student in Planetary Science at Caltech. He has researched a number of different topics, including polar ice caps on Mercury and the Moon, sand dunes on Mars, and the weather on Jupiter. For the last three years, he has been scrutinizing images of Jupiter's clouds, lightning, and aurora taken by NASA-JPL's Galileo spacecraft in order to understand the atmosphere of that giant, gaseous planet.

Ashwin began playing percussion in elementary school, and since then has played in concert bands, marching bands, and percussion ensembles through college at UCLA, and now at Caltech. "It's an incredible thrill to conduct the band and combine two of my passions in life—the exploration of the planets and the performance of music."
