William Bing, Director of Bands at Caltech, has been teaching at Caltech for over twenty-eight years. During that time, the bands have played many premieres and performed for over ten thousand people. In addition to his work at Caltech, Bill is a busy trumpet player. In the last month, Bill has performed at the Music Center with the Los Angeles Master Chorale and the Los Angeles Bach Festival in a performance of the B Minor Mass. Bill and his wife Delores have won many teaching awards including the ASCIT Teaching Award, Pasadena Youth Music Council Teachers of the Year, and most recently Honary Membership in the Caltech Alumni Association.

Paul Asimow is Assistant Professor of geology and geochemistry at Caltech. In real life, he does research on experimental melting of rocks and teaches students the delights of thermodynamics. More importantly, however, he played in and conducted the Caltech/Oxy Concert Band all through graduate school and, after a two-year postdoctoral stint playing tuba in the Columbia University Concert Band, returned to Caltech and its Band as a member of the faculty.

Donald Caldwell A scientist turned musician, Donald Caldwell went from an B.A. in Astronomy from UCLA to a D.M.A. in Choral Conducting from the University of Illinois. With two Ford Foundation Grants for studies in conducting and lieder performance, in Vienna and Munich, his teaching career has ranged from Bowdoin College, to the University of Illinois, to finally Caltech where he has conducted the Men's Glee Club and Chamber Singers since 1982. In addition to choral performance he has conducted extensively in orchestral, operatic and musical theatre idioms. He is also a vocal recitalist and professional actor with two one person plays to his credit, and as time allows, an endurance athlete with nationally ranked age group performances in ultra marathon competitions.

Andrew Mollner is a product of Califonia Public schools. He thoroughly enjoyed his years in the Los Angeles Unified School District, playing trumpet while at Brentwood Elementary's Science Magnet, Palms Junior. High's Math/Science Magnet, and Hamilton High School's Music Academy. Andrew earned a Bachelor of Science degree in chemistry and music from UC Davis and is currently working towards a PhD in Chemistry here at Caltech. Andrew dedicates this arrangement to graduating senior Maria Brumm and her kazoo, George...

Chad Kishimoto is currently a senior at Caltech, pursuing a bachelor's degree in physics. Born and raised in Honolulu, Hawaii, he was a member of the Roosevelt High School Symphonic Wind Ensemble and Marching Band. He has also had the honor of playing in the Hula Bowl All-Star Marching Band, Hawaii Youth Symphony and Hawaii State Select Band. In the fall of 1999, Chad matriculated to Caltech where he joined the Caltech-Occidental Wind Ensemble. For the past three years, he has served as the band manager for Bill Bing and in the past two year has taken on conducting duties. At Caltech, he helped to start the Caltech Pep Band and has been its musical director.

Dr. Leslie J. Deutsch (B.S. 1976, M.S. 1977, Ph.D. 1980, Caltech) began playing the trumpet at an early age, taught by his father, Ralph. Formal instruction in classical organ and harmony began at age 11. Throughout school, he taught himself to play several instruments each year so that now he performs on keyboards, brass, woodwinds and percussion — helping in his work as a composer of classical and jazz music.

Les studied Mathematics and Electrical Engineering at the Caltech and had an opportunity to combine his interests while working for his father, the inventor of the first real time digital electronic musical instruments. Les holds over 25 patents, mostly in electronic music. He has worked at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) since 1980. Recently he served as the acting Chief Technologist, an Executive Council position reporting to the

Laboratory Director. Currently, Les is the Chief Engineer for JPL's Interplanetary Networks Directorate, the organization responsible for providing communications, tracking, and network services across the solar system and within JPL. In prior assignments, Les led research for spacecraft avionics and communication systems. He led the team that rescued the Galileo spacecraft to Jupiter following the failure of its high-gain communications antenna. He has also was the NASA leader on an international team to rescue the Cassini mission's Huygens probe, which will explore the atmosphere and (hopefully) the surface of Saturn's moon 'Titan. Les has been awarded the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) Judith Resnick Medal and the NASA Exceptional Leadership Medal.

His career as an organist began while in high school. Unlike most serious organists, he had a strong Jewish upbringing. His mother, Charlotte, has always been active at the local synagogue, including serving in several volunteer management positions. Les has been an organist and choir director at several area churches and synagogues including Rosewood Methodist Church, Valley Beth Shalom, Temple Israel of Hollywood, Temple Aliyah, and Adat Ari El. Les is currently the choir director at Sha'arei Am Synagogue in Santa Monica, where he has composed and arranged music for some very talented soloists including Bill and Dolores Bing.

Les is also the Caltech organist, a position he has held since his sophomore year. He composes and arranges the music for Caltech's Convocation Brass and Percussion, a group that plays for academic ceremonies. When President George Bush (senior) spoke at commencement for the school's 100th anniversary, Les arranged special music including "Hail to the Chief" — which had to be approved by the Secret Service!

Les began playing on the Dixieland Circuit with the New Bull Moose Party Band in 1974. He joined the Hot Frogs Jumping Jazz Band as their pianist in 1986. The Frog's intense concert schedule led to his retirement from churches and synagogues. He joined the 10th Avenue Jazz Band in 1996 and performed on both piano and tuba with them until 1998. Les joined the Night Blooming Jazzmen in 2001 as their pianist, also doubling on trumpet, sax, and piccolo. This Nightbloomers are one of the most popular bands on the circuit and they play all over, all the time. His travels with bands have taken him to Canada, Mexico, the Mediterranean, and Russia where he participated in the celebrations for Moscow's 850th birthday.

In addition to playing organ and Dixieland jazz, Les performs in several Caltech ensembles. He has played trumpet, trombone, alto and baritone sax, clarinet, flute, piccolo, tuba, horn, and percussion with the concert band and trumpet, sax, and piano in the Thursday Jazz Band.

He also plays keyboards in the Ka-Band (a bop band), Alto Sax in the Big Band Theory (JPL's band), both lead and solo trumpet in swing big bands, and tuba in the San Marino Dad's Band Plus One (led by another Caltech band member, Patti Brugman.)

In 1997, he participated in a unique symposium in Padua, Italy, dedicated to Gallileo Gallilei. Les gave a technical paper on communications and played an organ concert of music of Galileo's time in the cathedral Galileo attended during his tenure there. The symposium ended with a private audience with one of its sponsors, Pope John-Paul II.

Les lives in Chatsworth with his wife of 22 years, Karen, and two musical and mathematical children, Elliot and Erica. Elliot has played with the Caltech bands in the past and currently plays the solo trumpet chair in the UCLA Jazz Band. Erica plays lead clarinet at Viewpoint High School's band and wants to attend Caltech in two years when she graduates, followed by graduate school at Harvard.
